Born in Salem Hospital on March 23, 1932, Edgar, was known by many as "Aluishious Humperdinkle." He was the son of the late Charles F. and Gladys S. (Greenlaw) Turner of Salem. He lived in Salem all of his young life where he attended the Pickman School, Pickering School, and graduated from Salem High School, class of 1950. Following graduation Edgar enlisted in the Navy. He went on to serve four years during the Korean War on the USS Bache (DDE 470) as Radioman, Third Class, Electronic Operator. He later attended Northeastern University where he received his Bachelor of Business Administration in Engineering and Management. He then soon went to work at General Electric in Lynn where he worked for the 25 years until his retirement. After retirement he worked for many more years at Hill's Family Store of Ipswich. He also served from 2000 to 2012 as a driver of the senior van for the Ipswich Council of Aging. He loved his job and enjoyed making the "seniors" smile and laugh.

Edgar enjoyed fishing with his children off the Kernwood Bridge and the pier in Gloucester. He looked forward to his annual long drives to Maine for early morning ice fishing. He'll be remembered for his favorite saying "open the gates for the smelt to come in." He also summer vacationed at his sister's camp in Maine with his

brothers, nephews, and children.

His love of sports included the Boston Bruins, the New England Patriots and the Red Sox having waited his whole life for the "curse to be reversed." He also enjoyed golfing, bowling, and was a champion horseshoe thrower. He loved gardening at the "church farm" where he labored tirelessly to bring home his world class tomatoes.
